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

- Purpose: Assist investigative needs, hotspot management, targeting, crime reduction and prevention.

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
# Intelligence-led crime reduction


UK Criminal Intelligence Strategy Group (Working Group 3) said:


"Analysts should not simply provide management with statistics and colourful charts but a real understanding of criminal activity and the direction in tackling it."

Not sufficient to identify the hotspot – analyst must also suggest a solution































































# Nick Tilley's matrix for street crime
