

Critical Elements considered for this Initiative



- What is the problem?
- Who is the target group and what is their contribution to the problem?
- How is the initiative dealing differently with the target group?
- What activities are being undertaken to prevent crime? Respond to crime?
- What is the governance structure?
- Long and short term effectiveness?

The Problem



- A significant number of autos being stolen – 3850 in 2001, Regina population 190 thousand
- Oldest fleet of autos in the country
- No integrated or coordinated process to manage the offenders involved
- Public and Political outcry

Regina Auto Theft Strategy



- Response to extreme concern in the community about the number of vehicles being stolen
- Partnership approach with Corrections, Justice, Police,
- Additional partners includes Community based organizations, Saskatchewan Government Insurance, school divisions
- Risk management, risk reduction
- Initial community skepticism
- Early results encouraging



The Strategy

- Implemented on January 31, 2002 for Young Offenders
- May 29, 2003 - Phase 2:
 - expanded the program to adult offenders
 - electronic monitoring for youth
 - additional Crown Prosecution staff
 - additional Meditation resources for Help Eliminate Auto Theft programming



Goals and Objectives

- Implementation of 4 key Elements
- To reduce auto thefts by 50% of the 2001 numbers of 3844 vehicles
- Goal: 1922 vehicles by 2005
- Increase community confidence in the Justice System
- Better programs and responses to clients and partners

Four Key Elements



- **Education and Information**

Goal->Provide information to high risk youth to prevent them from entering the Justice system, specific to auto theft

- 1st year - 1600 youth received information in 75 presentations in school, provided by a local Community Agency.
- From 2004 to present, Regina Police Service school resource officers assumed this responsibility and have completed over 60 presentations to another 2000 at risk youth.



Four Key Elements

- **Early Intervention - HEAT (Help Eliminate Auto Theft)**
 - Alternative Measures for 1st time auto theft offenders
 - Prior to January 2002, no auto theft charges had proceeded through mediation.
 - Delivered through the Regina Alternative Measures Program a local first nations community organization.
 - Designed to meet the needs of medium to high risk first-time offenders over 300 referrals to date.
 - The program is presently undergoing an independent outcomes review
 - Piloted the use of the Level of Service Inventory Risk Assessment Sask. Edition screening tool. {LSIsk}



Four Key Elements

- **Coordinated Supervision**
 - Strict Supervision and control of the highest need group of offenders most likely to re-offend
 - Dedicated Youth Workers, Police and resources to manage the supervision responsibilities
 - Young Offender staff complement included 4 community youth workers 1 supervisor and 1 institutional worker
 - Police Staff complement includes 10 full-time officers and 4 part-time officers.
 - Adult Probation, use of an existing Supervisor and one additional Probation Officer
 - Crown Prosecutors have two staff dedicated to this project



Four Key Elements

- **Integrated Supervision and Case Management**
 - An effective combination of enforcement and rehabilitation occurs through fostering the **communication and relationships** between partners **KEY** to the success.
 - Enhanced case conferencing between community corrections and custody staff
 - Effectively communicating the **risks and safety plans** to all the participants including the Judiciary
 - Providing **targeted** services to offenders both in the community and custody
 - Ensure targeted services are culturally relevant, Corrections engaged an aboriginal elder to work with identified youth and families



Four Key Elements

- **Integrated Supervision and Case Management cont.**
 - Daily summary of auto thefts is sent to all key partners from Police
 - Police supported, integrated data base for sharing information
 - Corrections sends a weekly auto theft report to all partners which includes ongoing thefts counted on a daily, weekly, monthly and year to year comparisons
 - Monthly meetings for frontline staff to discuss new candidates and removal of active candidates
 - Management meetings every 2 months
 - Information sharing with other police forces in the surrounding areas



Strategy Activities



- Current target group, 53 Chronic Repeat Offenders - includes 20 youth and 33 adults, all under significant supervision, this has changed from having primarily youth offenders to more adult offenders
- Providing targeted interventions that reflect the offenders risk and need, while addressing public safety this was a move from incident based to risk based supervision
- In 2004, we peaked with a record 11,522 curfew checks completed by Corrections and Police an average of 222 per week.




Results/Outcomes



- Positive partnerships and joint ownership of the issues and solutions
- Reduced auto thefts by 49%. This translates into a reduction of over 1900 cars by 2006 from 2001.
- Over the past five years, total reductions in autos are 7136
- Over 1 million dollars a year in insurance premiums saved
- Greater public confidence in the Justice System and safer communities.
- Two independent reviews of the strategy have been completed, one by Dr.Pfeifer, another by Dr. Wormith. Both reviews had favorable outcomes. These can be reviewed on www.cps.gov.sk.ca under publications


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


Number of motor vehicle thefts per year in three comparable cities



Program Recognition

- In May 2004 the Auto Theft Strategy and members received the Saskatchewan Provincial Premier's Award of Excellence
- In May 2004 the Coordinator of Help Eliminate Auto Theft (HEAT) received an award for her work from the City of Regina's Crime Prevention Committee
- Justice Canada recognition of Regina Police Service for their creation and involvement in the HEAT program
- In May 2005 a Merit award to the Regina Police Services, from the Central Canadian Auto Theft Association
- June 2007 Ottawa Public Policy Forum profiles the Auto Theft Strategy for its collaboration and innovation
